

#### A Message from Our Pastor: Dr. Jerome E. King



My Brothers and Sisters of Mount Moriah, welcome to the 2020 season of Lent! During Lent (40 days typically excluding Sundays) we join Christians around the world as they prepare to celebrate the resurrection of our Lord and Savior. As your Under Shephard, I am blessed to lead our church through this 40-day journey of Fasting and Praying, as we experience spiritual transformation through our fellowship with God and one another. I am inviting you to participate in this transformational and spiritual journey as we renew our commitment to God. Consistent with the true meaning of the season of Passion, our theme this year is *Giving God Plenty in 2020*.

Despite the various concerns and cares that we face personally, we're living in an age of great spiritual need with opportunities to serve. This is our year to *Realize the Possibility in 20/20!* How? By following the example of our Lord. "Jesus went through all the towns and villages, teaching in their synagogues, preaching the good news of the kingdom and healing every disease and sickness. When he saw the crowds, he had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field." He called his twelve disciples to him and gave them authority to drive out evil spirits and to heal every disease and sickness" (Matthew 9:35-10:1). When Jesus witnessed the desperate conditions of those around Him, He diagnosed their need was spiritual. He was moved with compassion and explained to the disciples their need to pray for the people's spiritual care by asking God to provide spiritual workers. God's answer to their prayers was spiritual awakening and calling them into His service.

Jesus' prescription to address the ills of our society is to engage His disciples in prayer and send them into service. During the next 40 days, I'm encouraging you to join me in praying to the Lord of the harvest for those who are in desperate need of Him. The extended periods of quiet time with God and fasting, which is one of the most extraordinary spiritual disciplines that Christians are encouraged to practice, has been transformational in the life of Mount Moriah members. While we usually practice daily devotions and spiritual disciplines, in these extraordinary times we're extending this special call for a church-wide fast. Fasting is broader than our daily devotions, prayer time and reading the Bible. Fasting goes throughout a day or more and involves partially or completely abstaining from food with a desire to seek God more intimately by denying the desires of our flesh, while feeding our Spirit. Our church-wide fast will begin, Ash Wednesday, February 26th and culminate on Sunday, April 5th Palm Sunday (a week before Resurrection Sunday).

If you are unable to fully or partially commit to the church fast, I want to encourage you to partner with your brothers and sisters in Christ as we draw near to God through prayer. Moreover, be mindful of others who are fasting by exercising sensitivity and restraint by

refusing to bring non-fast friendly foods to the campus. The church will take added steps to assist in this endeavor, by modifying our snacks and beverages in the True Vine Café and snack machines on campus.

During this 40-day journey of spiritual growth (with or without fasting), there are several options for you to consider as you pursue greater intimacy with Christ, including the following:

- *Corporate Prayer* Sunday morning prayer at 8 a.m. in the worship center.
- *Individual Prayer* Use the prayer journal to mediate on God's word and pray in the morning, noon day and in the evening privately in coordination with your church family.
- *Discipleship* Attend a small group study (Wednesday nights at 6:30 p.m. or Sunday mornings at 8:30 a.m.), and attend Bible study (Wednesdays at noon or 7:30 p.m.).
- **Corporate Worship** Prayerfully prepare and participate in Sunday worship services at 10:00 a.m. weekly.
- Reading and praying over Scripture for at least 15-30 minutes daily.

Through His unfaltering love, demonstrated on the cross at Calvary, Jesus made the ultimate sacrifice for each of us. During this season of Lent we sacrifice, reflect on this sacrificial love, and seek to grow in our love relationship with God. I encourage you to seize this opportunity, get involved in this 40-day journey, and watch God do something extraordinary in and through you. This spiritual awakening will not only change our lives, but positively impact the lives of our families, our church and our communities as God transforms us into the likeness of His son.

Lastly, remember to pray for our church (spiritual, numerical and financial growth), our leadership, for the Lord to send us more laborers, for the success of our efforts to fulfill the Great Commission, and every ministry endeavor delineated during our vision and state of the church meeting. Pray for yourself personally for the Lord to guide you in how He would have you to invest your Time, Talents, and Treasures as you endeavor to give Him plenty in 2020. As believers, we have a spiritual responsibility to share the Gospel around the world. One of our priorities is to get the people from the streets to the seats and back on the streets as witnesses for Christ in fulfilling the Great Commission, "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit (Mathew 28:19).

#### **FASTING: WHAT'S IT ALL ABOUT**

But Daniel made up his mind that he would not defile himself with the king's choice food or with the wine which he drank; -Daniel 1:8

Fasting is eating sparingly or abstaining from food altogether, either from necessity or desire. In medical terms, fasting is the detoxification of the body through the restriction of food.

Spiritual fasting entails setting aside activities as well as reducing the intake of food and replacing these activities with the exercise of prayer and preoccupation with spiritual concerns. The *New Testament (NT) word which is translated "fasting" literally means one who has not eaten, one who is empty.* 

Three types of fast are generally recognized:

- An absolute fast, in which there is total abstinence from food and liquids in all forms.
- A *normal fast*, in which there is no intake of food for a prescribed period of time, though there may be an intake of liquids.
- A partial fast, in which the diet is limited, though some food is allowed.

The context of fasting is prayer. Fasting should conform to the same conditions as prayer: unostentatious quietness before God, arising out of gratitude, expressing thanksgiving, and grounded in faith, as a means of spiritual growth.

#### **FASTING GUIDELINES**

The fast Mount Moriah will undertake is a progressive, partial fast based on the Daniel Fast. (see below and the following page). There are three options for participating in the fast: Level 1, Level 2 and Level 3. You may choose to engage at either of the levels based on your physical circumstance and/or spiritual need.

#### **Level 1 Fast**

Days 1 - 40 (February 26 - April 5)

Daniel Fast plus baked or broiled fish, turkey or chicken (maximum 6 oz.)

#### Level 2 Fast (Standard Church Fast)

Days 1 - 30 (February 26 - March 26)

Daniel Fast plus baked or broiled fish, turkey or chicken (maximum 6 oz.)

Days 31 - 40 (March 27 - April 5)

Daniel Fast only, No Meats (discontinue fish, turkey, and chicken)

#### Level 3 Fast (Extended Fast)

Days 1 - 30 (February 26 - March 26)

Daniel Fast plus baked or broiled fish, turkey or chicken (maximum 6 oz.)

Days 31 - 46 (March 27 - April 11)

Daniel Fast only, No Meats (discontinue fish, turkey, and chicken)

#### DANIEL FAST FOOD LIST

#### **Foods to Have:**

All Fruits: apples, apricots, avocados, bananas, berries, blackberries, blueberries, boysenberries, breadfruit, cantaloupe, cherries, coconuts, cranberries, dates, figs, grapefruit, grapes, grenadine, guava, honeydew melons, kiwi, lemons, limes, mangoes, melons, mulberry, nectarines, oats, olives, oranges, papayas, peaches, pears, pineapples, plums, prunes, raisins, raspberries, strawberries, tangelos, tangerines, watermelon, etc. (Canned, Fresh or Frozen)

All Vegetables: artichokes, asparagus, beets, broccoli, brussel sprouts, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, celery, chili peppers, corn, cucumbers, eggplant, garlic, gingerroot, kale, leeks, lettuce, mushrooms, mustard greens, okra, onions, parsley, any peppers, any potatoes, radishes, rutabagas, scallions, spinach, sprouts, squashes, sweet potatoes, tomatoes, turnips, watercress, yams, zucchini, etc. (Canned, Fresh or Frozen)

All Whole Grains: brown rice, oats, rolled oats, oatmeal, barley, corn, popcorn, wheat, etc.

**Legumes**: dried beans, pinto beans, split peas, lentils, black eyed peas, green beans, green peas, peanuts, kidney beans, cannellini beans, black beans, etc. Grain legumes include beans, lentils, peas and peanuts. (Canned, Fresh or Frozen)

Seeds: all nuts, natural peanut butter, natural almond butter, sprouts, ground flax, etc.

**Liquids**: spring water, distilled water, filtered water, 100% all natural fruit or vegetable juices

Oils: All quality oils including olive, canola, grape seed, peanut, and sesame

**Other:** Tofu, soy products, vinegar, seasonings, salt, herbs, and spices.

#### Foods to Avoid:

All meat and animal products, all dairy products, all sweeteners, all leaven bread (including Ezekiel Bread), All refined and processed foods, All deep fried foods, all solid fats, all coffee, tea, herbal teas, carbonated beverages, energy drinks, etc.

#### Preparing for your fast:

While fasting you may not consume any caffeine, sugar or sweeteners of any kind. You should not have anything artificial. This may cause many to experience the same feelings associated with detoxing. Consume as much water as possible.

The primary nature of this fast is *spiritual*, however, it does include adjustments to one's daily diet. Therefore, Mount Moriah Church strongly encourages you to consult your personal physician prior to engaging in the fast.

Everyone is encouraged to consult their physician prior to beginning the fast.

#### ENDING THE FAST

Every undertaking in life requires a good start and an even better finish. As we conclude our 40 day fast, how we come off of the fast is of supreme importance. Just as the fast began with a plan, it is best to end the fast with a plan as well. The information following is intended to share some practical and portable principles that will prepare you to conclude the fast and continue its results.

Pause to praise and thank God.

#### Pace yourself

- If you have gone 24 hours or longer with only water to drink you do not want to suddenly introduce a heavy meal into your stomach. Begin with a little fruit, and some "light" (easy to digest) foods.
- If you have gone 24 hours or longer consuming water only, you should try to avoid meats, dairy products, and any fats or oils for a week or more. Re-introduce them very slowly and in small amounts. If you choose to disregard this advice, please be careful to consume these items in small amounts and at a very slow pace. You should not immediately return to what was your normal consumption. By now, whether you realize it or not, you nor your body is the same. You and your body have changed during the fast. Returning to your previously normal eating routine may shock your body, spirit and mind. The ultimate consequence could be that you end up worse after the fast than you were before the fast in physical, mental and spiritual health.
- Realize your stomach is smaller now, so eat lightly. Stop eating before or no later than the moment you feel full. If you were raised to eat everything on your plate, you have just three options: 1) prepare or order smaller portions, 2) eat what you can and save the rest for later or 3) eat what your stomach will allow and consider yourself excused.
- As a general rule and especially during the first week after the fast, try to stay away
  from starches like white pastas, white rice, or white bread. Wheat pasta, brown rice
  and whole wheat bread, including Melba toast, are much better for you if you choose or
  feel the need to consume these food items.
- It might be wise to start with a little soup, something thin and nourishing such as vegetable broth made from onion, celery, potatoes, and carrots. Fresh fruits such as watermelon and cantaloupe might also be suggested as you start your post-fast eating.
- In terms of resuming any sort of exercise routine, the advice is the same. Start out slowly, allowing time for your body to re-adjust to its usual regimen.

Continue to practice a healthy lifestyle.

Week 1 | Day 3: Friday, February 28

Search me, O God, and know my heart; Try me and know my anxious thoughts; And see if there be any hurtful way in me, And lead me in the everlasting way. – Psalm 139:23-24

The essence of biblical repentance is beautifully embedded in the old and often-repeated story of the prodigal son. The young man found himself not only broke—having left his family home and spent his inheritance—but broken. While feeding swine in a pigpen, he actually longed for the husks they were eating, and he "came to himself" (Luke 15:17). This first step in the repentance process, this change of mind, brought about the second step, a change in his will, his volition. In the next verse he exclaimed, "I will arise and go to my father." Once his mind and will were changed, his actions were sure to follow. Thus we read, "He arose and came to his father" (v. 20).

Repentance is a change of mind. That is it! And how do we know that we have truly changed our minds? Our volition will be changed as well, and our changed actions—resulting in a new life direction—will follow as naturally as water running downhill. Repentance and faith are inseparable, born at the same time. They are two sides of the same coin. Repentance alone will not get you to heaven, but you can't get there without it. No wonder Jesus said, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Matthew 4:17).

WEEK 1 | DAY 4: SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 29



Draw near to God and He will draw near to you.

WEEK 3 | DAY 13: MONDAY, MARCH 9

Therefore beseech the Lord of the harvest to send out workers into His harvest. - Matthew 9:38

There are no nations in Jesus Christ's outlook, but *the world*. How many of us pray without respect of persons, and with respect to only one Person, Jesus Christ? He owns the harvest that is produced by distress and conviction of sin, and this is the harvest we have to pray that laborers may be thrust out to reap. We are taken up by active work while people all around are ripe to harvest, and we do not reap one of them, but waste our Lord's time in overenergized activities. Some would-be disciples pledged their willingness to follow Jesus, but they told Him they were not ready yet. In Jesus' day, a Jewish man was expected to care for his elderly parents until they died. One man wanted to wait until his father died before going with Jesus. This would be an honorable delay. The man had to choose between this important responsibility and heeding a call from the Lord. Yet God knew this man, and He knew the man's father. God would have taken care of the man's father, if he only would have followed Jesus. This was an opportunity to walk with the Son of God, yet the concerns of this life were competing for priority with obedience to God.

Timing our obedience is crucial. Invitations from God come with a limited opportunity to respond. Some opportunities to serve Him, if not accepted immediately, will be lost. Occasions to minister to others may pass us by. When God invites us to intercede for someone, it may be critical that we stop what we are doing and immediately adjust our lives to what God is doing. Missing opportunities to serve the Lord can be tragic. When an invitation comes from God, the time to respond is now.

Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations..." – Matthew 28:18–19

We are inclined to look on our Lord as one who assists us in our endeavors for God. Yet our Lord places Himself as the absolute sovereign and supreme Lord over His disciples. He does not say that the lost will never be saved if we don't go—He simply says, "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations . . ." He says, "Go on the basis of the revealed truth of My sovereignty, teaching and preaching out of your living experience of Me."

"Go therefore . . ." To "go" simply means to live. Acts 1:8 is the description of how to go. Jesus did not say in this verse, "Go into Jerusalem, Judea, and Samaria," but, ". . . you shall be witnesses to Me in [all these places]." He takes upon Himself the work of sending us.

"If you abide in Me, and My words abide in you . . ." (John 15:7)—that is the way to keep going. Where we are placed is then a matter of indifference to us, because God sovereignly engineers our goings. "None of these things move me; nor do I count my life dear to myself, so that I may finish my race with joy, and the ministry which I received from the Lord Jesus . . ." (Acts 20:24). That is how to keep going until we are gone from this life.

Each believer in Jesus is designed, gifted, and called to meet needs.

As someone who claims the name of Jesus, you are called to season the world with your salt and shine your light into it. You may not want a prominent role, and you may not even desire the responsibility of bearing His name, for fear that you won't live up to it. But His name is given to you anyway, and for better or worse, you will shape His reputation in the eyes of others. Jesus' words to his disciples unapologetically commission them as agents of his Kingdom. They signal a high calling for all his followers—then and now—to be exactly what the world needs.

"So I brought him to Your disciples, but they could not cure him." Then Jesus answered and said, "O faithless and perverse generation ... how long shall I bear with you?" – Matthew 17: 16-17

Jesus gave His disciples the power to cast out demons and to perform miracles of healing (Matt. 10: 8). He gave them His authority to minister to people, yet they became so self-centered that they lost the power to do the work of God. When God sent a father with his epileptic son to them for healing, they failed miserably. They were so concerned with position and status (Mark 9: 32— 35) that they lost their focus on what God wanted to do through them.

Jesus' response to His disciples included some of the harshest words ever to come from His mouth. He called His own disciples "unbelieving" and "perverse" and questioned how much longer He had to endure them! Why? Because they were supposed to be on mission with Him to bring salvation to others, but they had become so disoriented to Him that they were spiritually powerless, lacking the faith to bring physical and spiritual comfort to those God had sent to them.

God ought to be able to send hurting persons to any child of His and expect that they will be helped. Like the disciples, we can become so preoccupied with our own ambitions and distracted by the busyness of our lives that we become ineffective in ministering to those whom God sends to us. It is even possible to become so involved in religious activity that we are of no help to anyone. Regularly take inventory of your life to see if you are being a faithful steward of every life God sends to you.

But what is the consequence? What did Jonah lose by his conduct? He lost the presence and comfortable enjoyment of God's love. When we serve our Lord Jesus as believers should, our God is with us. Though we have the whole world against us, if we have God with us, what does it matter? But the moment we turn back and seek our own desires, we are at sea without a pilot. Then may we bitterly lament and groan, "O my God, where have You gone? How could I have been so foolish as to shun Your service and thus lose all the brightness of Your face? This price is too high. Let me return to my allegiance so that I may rejoice in Your presence."

Jonah also lost all peace of mind ... Jonah lost everything on which he might have drawn comfort in any other situation. He could not plead the promise of divine protection, for he was not in God's will. He could not say, "Lord, I met with these difficulties in the course of my duty; therefore, help me through them." He was reaping his own deeds; he was filled with his own ways. Christian, do not act like Jonah, unless you wish to have all the waves and the billows rolling over your head. In the long run, you will find that it is far harder to shun the work and will of God than to yield yourself to it immediately. Jonah lost his time, for he had to go to Tarshish after all. It is hard to contend with God. Let us yield ourselves to Him right now.

The mission fields are crying out for Christians to go and share the gospel with those who've never heard it. What we need is not more pleas for volunteers, but an outpouring of the power of God. When God comes among His people in power, there is never a shortage of volunteers or resources for His work!

When Christians today are asked what aspects of the Christian life are most important to them, missions is not usually ranked as a priority. This is because we have lost track of why God called us in the first place. We were not saved from our sin simply so that we would qualify for heaven. God delivered us so we would have a relationship with Him through which He could carry out His mission to redeem a lost world.

Only the power of God can free us from our natural self-centeredness and reorient us toward the mission of God. There is no need to pray that God would come in power. That is the only way He ever comes. We need hearts that are so responsive to Him that He will choose to demonstrate His power through us. Is your heart so filled with love for God that you are watching for the first opportunity to say with Isaiah, "Here am I. Send me!"?

"He who believes in Me ... 'From his innermost being will flow rivers of living water." - John 7:38

A river reaches places which its source never knows. And Jesus said that, if we have received His fullness, "rivers of living water" will flow out of us, reaching in blessing even "to the end of the earth" (Acts 1:8) regardless of how small the visible effects of our lives may appear to be. We have nothing to do with the outflow—"This is the work of God, that you believe . . ." (John 6:29). God rarely allows a person to see how great a blessing he is to others.

A river is victoriously persistent, overcoming all barriers. For a while it goes steadily on its course, but then comes to an obstacle. And for a while it is blocked, yet it soon makes a pathway around the obstacle. Or a river will drop out of sight for miles, only later to emerge again even broader and greater than ever... The river of the Spirit of God overcomes all obstacles. Never focus your eyes on the obstacle or the difficulty ... Think of the healing and far-reaching rivers developing and nourishing themselves in our souls! God has been opening up wonderful truths to our minds, and every point He has opened up is another indication of the wider power of the river that He will flow through us. If you believe in Jesus, you will find that God has developed and nourished in you mighty, rushing rivers of blessing for others.

I lift up my eyes to the hills. From where does my help come?

My help comes from the LORD, who made heaven and earth. — Psalm 121:1–2 (ESV)

As followers of Jesus, we are on the road again in Lent, walking the way of obedience to Jerusalem for the big showdown with the authorities of church and state. It turns out, every time, to be a hazardous journey, full of toils and snares, potholes and adversaries, ending in a rigged trial. But women and men of faith are always on the road again, departing safe places, running risks, and hoping for well-being on the journey.

The defining journey of biblical faith begins in the departure of Abraham and Sarah back in the book of Genesis. They were dispatched by God to leave their safe place, to go to a new land yet to be given, to get a new name, to be blessed by God, and to be a blessing to the others around them. They went! And their family, generation after generation, has gone. And we, finally in their wake, must also travel beyond safe places to the gifted end that God intends, hopefully to be blessed and a blessing on the way.

And if we ponder our destination, perhaps it is to be to the neighborhood of shalom, the neighborhood of shared resources, of inclusive politics, of random acts of hospitality and intentional acts of justice, of fearless neighborliness that is not propelled by greed or anxiety or excessive self-preoccupation.

Psalm 121 is designed exactly for travelers who face a demanding, risky journey. It is a psalm that has been used over and over by travelers and now is available for us. This psalm is an assurance and an affirmation that the journey we now undertake is not by ourselves alone. We are surrounded on the way by the God of all trust, the God who kept Abraham and Sarah safely, the one who walked all the way to Jerusalem with Jesus, all the way to Friday and on through to Sunday.

## THE TRUE TEMPLE

PALM SUNDAY | DAY 40: APRIL 5



Jesus answered them, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." The Jews then said, "It has taken forty-six years to build this temple, and will you raise it up in three days?"

But he was speaking about the temple of his body. — John 2:19–21

The Gospel of John likes to play tricks. For temple, think Jesus. For destroyed temple, think Friday crucifixion. For rebuilt temple, think Easter resurrection. So think of temple as the symbolic center of your life, as the place where you are met by the goodness and holiness of God, where you draw fresh on the core purpose of your life, where you get some clarity about who you are and what your life amounts to and how you will be remembered. And then think of duties and disciplines that belong to becoming fully whom you are called by God to be.

And then imagine, what if we are in the wrong temple, imagining our life in misguided ways and committed in the wrong directions? What if we are thinking temple-mall, theater, market, indulgence, when we should be thinking about Jesus and death and obedience and suffering and new life and joy?

In the wrong temple! The one where he came to clean things out and upset tables with a passion that seemed like violence: there is business and busyness and selling and trading and hoping to get ahead and buying access to God in the way you can buy it at the White House or in Congress, going there to be seen and valued and reassured. And then there is a sign, a deep gesture, a disturbance, an invitation that says, "You have got the wrong holy place, for the presence of God is not there."

The news is that this temple called Jesus is our true habitat. That is where we are bound in faith to live our life and put our buckets down and dream our dreams and claim our identities. Most of us, most of the time, find ourselves in the wrong temple, places that make promises of safety that leave us more anxious, offers of joy that leave us disconsolate. Partly we are in the wrong place by will, partly by habit, partly by accident, partly seduced. Our work in Lent is to move from these fake temples to the true temple who is Jesus. And then to receive a different life, the life he lives, the one to which we are invited.
